Comprehensive Literacy Grant Budget Narrative

The following is the budget narrative for the Comprehensive Literacy Grant, organized by year and grade-band. Evaluator costs for each year are contracted services that are split across grade bands. Workshop wages will also be provided each year, as needed, to procure temporary help to assist with the implementation of the project and grant activities.

Year 1: Birth-Age 5

The first year will focus on developing consistency among prekindergarten programs. HCPSS prekindergarten teachers will receive professional learning (PL) on core components/exemplary scheduling for half-day and full-day programs. Staff from the Office of Early Childhood Programs, as well as school-based administrators and Reading Support Teachers (RSTs), will conduct walkthroughs to ensure fidelity of implementation. New curriculum will be piloted and those teachers will receive training from the vendor and HCPSS staff. Similar work will begin with the Head Start program.

Additionally, consistency with assessment is needed. Prekindergarten teachers will receive differentiated professional learning on the Maryland Early Learning Assessment (ELA). HCPSS will develop rubrics, data collection and formative assessment tools, and other ELA-aligned materials to support a more consistent and comprehensive approach to assessment to monitor progress of individual students in order to plan responsive instruction.

Year 1: Grades K-5

The first year will focus on developing a consistent, comprehensive assessment program to monitor the progress of individual students in order to plan responsive instruction. Teachers will participate in a yearlong professional learning (group PL as well as team-based and individual coaching) to ensure fidelity of administration of the assessment protocol.

Funding will provide updated assessment tools and yearlong training with all classroom teachers on how to administer the assessments with fidelity as well as how to use that data to make instructional decisions for students, particularly those struggling with reading and/or at-risk of reading underperformance.

Development of consistent intervention programs across all schools will also be an area of focus during the first year. Funding will provide new tools for intervention. The Reading Specialists (RS) and Special Educators will be provided with continuous site-based training on the new intervention tools. Progress monitoring of the reading intervention programs will happen throughout the school year.

The first year will focus on systemic and consistent implementation of the instructional program. Read 180 Next Generation Stage B will be converted to Read 180 Universal Stage B for ten middle schools and Homewood Center and Read 180 Universal Stage B will be provided to three additional middle schools (1 from grant funds, 2 from operating funds). Additional laptops will be purchased to run Read 180 at the schools. Ninety-five System 44 licenses will be converted to Read 180 Universal licenses and classroom pack materials will be purchased. Reading Specialists will participate in year-long professional learning and coaching to ensure fidelity in the implementation of the program. Staff will work with stakeholders to choose an appropriate, effective comprehensive intervention program.

By receiving funds under this grant award, I hereby agree, as grantee, to comply with the following terms and conditions:

- 1. - 4. Grantee shall establish and maintain fiscal control, fund accounting procedures by fund, as set forth in 2 CFR §200 and in applicable statute and regulation. Unless a division implements a stricter policy, grantee must receive prior written approval from the MSDE Program Monitor for any budgetary realignment of \$1,000 or 15% of total object, program or category of expenditure, whichever is greater. Grantee must support the request with the reason for the requested change. Budget realignments must be submitted at least 45 days prior to the end of the grant period.
- 9. Requests for grant extension, when allowed, must be submitted at least 45 days prior to the end of the grant period.
- 10. Grantee shall insure that programs and projects that offer web-based or technology band instructional products or programs which are funded in total or in part through this grant will operate in compliance with Section 508 of the Federal Rehabilitation Act of 1973 as amended and Section 7 -910 of the Education Article, Annotated Code of Maryland.

Project Specific Performance Measures

Goal #1: Instructional Leadership:

What progress have you made towards increased participation in professional learning opportunities in literacy targeted to school based instructional leaders?

Operation and Title II funds are being utilized to provide professional learning opportunities on implementing Tier I and Tier II decoding and comprehension instruction with fidelity. Reading Offices are working with administrators so they can better support and monitor reading instruction. SRCL grant funds have not yet been used due to August receipt of funds, but will be later in SY18-19 and in SY19-20.

Goal #2: Strategic Professional Learning:

What progress have you made towards increased participation in professional learning opportunities in literacy targeted to Early Childhood providers and teachers PreK-12 that is based upon a needs assessment?

Universal screening measures have been purchased and have begun to be implemented. Upon analysis of baseline data, Reading Office staff will work with school-based instructors to identify potentially at risk students and match them with an appropriate Tier II reading intervention. Such interventions have also been purchased and are being rolled out to schools.



Goal #3: Comprehensive System of Assessments:

What progress have you made towards increased participation in school based data-informed decision making activities?

Awaiting end of Q1 (November 2018) to complete analysis of baseline data. Reading Office staff will then work with school-based instructors to identify potentially at risk students and match them with an appropriate Tier II reading intervention. Such interventions have been purchased and are being rolled out to schools. Central Office staff will work with school teachers and administrators on how to use data to drive instructional decision-making and the provision of interventions to students at-risk of not meeting reading standards.

Goal #4: Tiered Instruction and Interventions:

What progress have you made towards increased use of instructional materials and interventions supported by strong and moderate evidence?

Tier II intervention materials have been purchased for students in all grade bands. Central Office reading staff are working to provide appropriate professional learning opportunities to teachers and school-based staff, focusing on fidelity of implementation. At the elementary level, these are being spearheaded by the Reading Support Teachers (RSTs) who work directly with each school. At the secondary level, stakeholder groups are meeting to discuss best practices for using data to drive selection of the most effective Tier II interventions based on students' decoding, fluency, and comprehension strengths and needs.
