IMMEDIATE REQUEST FOR EMERGENCY HEARING

Plaintiff, Martin Dimitrov, by and through counsel, Shavina Kumar Mukesh, Esquire and Edward Tayter, Esquire, pursuant to Maryland Rule 1-351 requests an Immediate Emergency Hearing and in support thereof, states as follows:

- On or about December 11, 2019 Plaintiff filed a Petition for Permanent and Other 1. Injunctive Relief Pursuant to the Open Meetings Act (hereinafter referred to as "Petition").
- 2. Defendant was served with a Writ of Summons and Petition on or about December 12, 2019, see Affidavit of Service attached hereto as Exhibit A.
- Plaintiff's underlying complaint in the Petition is that the votes taken in redistricting of 3. Howard County Public Schools were in willful and flagrant violation of the Open Meetings Act; specifically, when Defendant closed the session, meeting to discuss "the impacts of that last failed motion" on November 21, 2019.
- 4. On December 11, 2019 Defendant amended its Quarterly Agenda (attached hereto as Exhibit B) to include "Ratification of Vote on Redistricting" as an additional agenda item for the December 17, 2019 Regular Board Meeting - Administrative Meeting. Upon information and belief, Defendant in doing so in an attempt to revisit the voting of redistricting schools. Furthermore, Defendant has started to implement actions such as putting large contracts into place based on their illegal votes.
- That Defendant may further attempt to damage the public's trust in their democratically 5. elected institutions by "authorizing" the previously identified illegal votes at the December 17, 2019 meeting of the Defendant Board of Education. "Violations of those [OMA] mandates are not 'technical' in nature, nor are they ever harmless." Floyd v. Baltimore City Council, et al., 241 Md. App. 199 (2019)





Plaintiff Martin Dimitrov by and through counsel, Shavina Kumar Mukesh, Esquire and Edward Tayter, Esquire, brings forth the following causes of action and alleges the following:

PARTIES

- Plaintiff Martin Dimitrov is an individual and resident of Howard County, Maryland.
 Plaintiff is a resident of Polygon 1132 and has a child currently attending Clemens Crossing
 Elementary School in second grade.
- 2. Defendant BOARD OF EDUCATION OF HOWARD COUNTY is a "Public body" as defined in MD Code Ann., GP Title 3 (hereinafter "the Open Meetings Act") under §3-101(h)(1)).
- 3. Defendant moved Plaintiff's Polygon from Clemens Crossing Elementary School to Bryant Woods Elementary School in a vote immediately following a secretive, closed-door meeting that violated the Open Meetings Act.

JURISDICTION AND VENUE

- 4. This Court has subject-matter jurisdiction over Dimitrov's claims pursuant to the Open Meetings Act, MD Code Ann., GP § 3-401(b)(1), and MD Code Ann., Educ. § 3-104(b)(2).
- 5. Venue in this Court is proper under MD Code Ann., Cts. & Jud. Proc. § 1-501 because all defendants reside and work in the judicial district and the events giving rise to this claim have occurred in this district as part of the official business of the Board of Education of Howard County.

BACKGROUND FACTS

- 6. On or about January 25, 2018, Board chair Mavis Ellis completed a required Open Meetings Act training.
- 7. On or about January 24, 2019, Defendant Board of Education of Howard County directed the Superintendent to begin the "system wide school boundary review, due to population growth that resulted in overcrowding at many schools, while others are underutilized." Howard County Public School System ("HCPSS") website. The accuracy of this statement has not been established by any reliable data.
- 8. On or about August 22, 2019, the Superintendent presented his proposed redistricting plan, which included his goal of evening out the socioeconomic disparities in HCPSS schools.
- The Board held seven public hearings on redistricting between September 17, 2019 and
 October 15, 2019.
- 10. The Board held nine public work sessions on redistricting between October 17, 2019 and November 18, 2019.

- During the November 7, 2019 public work session, community members were audibly upset by a discussion over a particular proposed move. Board member Jennifer Mallo admonished the audience by saying: "We have chosen to support each other as Board members. We are not denigrating to each other. We do not raise our voices to each other... We don't intimidate each other and we don't bully each other. You are allowed in these meetings through the Open Meetings Act. Your behavior must conform to HCPSS Policy 1000 Civility.". This further emphasizes that the Board is very familiar with the requirements of the Open Meetings Act.
- 12. On November 21, 2019 the Defendant Board took a series of public votes to effectuate redistricting of the HCPSS. One of the votes taken was to move Polygons 132, 1132 and 2132 from Clemens Crossing Elementary School to Bryant Woods Elementary School. This vote failed by a 3 to 4 margin, with Board Chair Ellis, Board member Mallo and Board member Taj voting to move the Polygons, while the remainder of the Board voting against the move. As soon as this vote failed, Board member Mallo immediately stated "I move that we go into recess to consider the impacts of that last failed motion." This motion was seconded by Board member Taj. Board chair Ellis also stated "We will go into recess." Board member Wu asked "Do we need a vote?" and Board administrator Hanks and Board chair Ellis stated "No."
- 13. The Board then went into a Closed Session in direct and willful violation of Open Meetings Act §3-305(c).
- 14. The Open Meetings Act §3-305(d) states:

"unless a majority of the members of a public body present and voting vote in favor of a closed meeting session, the board many not meet in closed session."

- 15. The Board returned from their Closed Session and voted again on the failed motion. This time, the motion to move Polygons 132, 1132, and 2132 passed with a 4 to 3 margin. Board member Coombs changed her vote and, visibly shaken and crying, stated "otherwise the whole plan will fail."
- 16. The Open Meetings Act §3-102(a) states:

"In general. -- It is essential to the maintenance of a democratic society that, except in special and appropriate circumstances:

- (1) public business be conducted openly and publicly; and
- (2) the public be allowed to observe:
 - (i) the performance of public officials; and
 - (ii) the deliberations and decisions that the making of public policy involves. "
- 17. The Open Meetings Act §3-301 states:

"Except as otherwise expressly provided in this title, a public body shall meet in open session."

18. The Open Meetings Act §3-305(c) further states:

"A public body that meets in closed session under this section may not discuss or act on any matter not authorized under subsection (b) of this section."

- 19. The Board's Closed Session during the November 21, 2019 vote does not fit within any of the exceptions defined in Open Meetings Act §3-305(b). Therefore, the Board failed to comply with the substantive requirements of the Open Meetings Act.
- 20. The Board failed to comply with the procedural requirements of the Open Meetings Act §3-305(d) which states:
 - "(1) Unless a majority of the members of a public body present and voting vote in favor of closing the session, the public body may not meet in closed session.
 - (2) Before a public body meets in closed session, the presiding officer shall:
 - (i) conduct a recorded vote on the closing of the session; and
 - (ii) make a written statement of the reason for closing the meeting, including a citation of the authority under this section, and a listing of the topics to be discussed.

- 21. The Board also failed to comply with its own policy which in pertinent part states: "However, at no time shall any group of Board members, whose number would satisfy quorum requirements, meet privately on any issue that requires a public meeting."²
- 22. The Closed Session was used by certain board members to attempt to persuade Board Member Coombs to change her vote, a subject that should have only been addressed in an Open Session.
- 23. The public did not have access to the deliberations related to this important topic, as mandated by the Open Meetings Act.
- 24. Allowing the Board to change its initial vote in clear and willful violation of the Open Meetings Act will affect approximately 60 children from Polygons 132, 1132 and 2132 who will be required to change their current school in their local community. Changing schools is highly disruptive to young children, who will be uprooted from their community, friends and established after-school activities. It also necessitates additional travel time to a school that is much farther away, requiring bussing and preventing children from walking to a school that is less than a mile away for many children in the Polygons.
- 25. Plaintiff's eight year old child, as well as many other children as young as five years old, will suffer imminent and irreparable harm. These young children will be required to move to a school that is 2.4 miles away from their home; their current school is 0.5-0.7 miles away, well within walking distance. This commute will take at least an additional two (2) hours per week of the childrens time, thereby allowing less time for extra-curricular activities, homework, family time and even rest time. The minor children, on a daily basis will have to wake up earlier and get

home later so that they can commute to a school that is across town, crossing many major intersections during rush hour. The minor children being on the school bus for an additional two (2) hours per week will also expose them to more chances of traffic accidents, bullying as well as the added fatigue caused by this additional unnecessary commute. The injury is evident and cannot be quantified or remedied monetarily. Moreover, the passage of time does not render this harm less severe – in fact it does the opposite.

- 26. Furthermore, the HCPSS is currently putting into place budgets and plans to support the new redistricting plan. At some point, it is simply impossible for these plans to be undone because of the time it takes to plan for the next school year.
- 27. The harm to the education and lives of these children significantly outweighs any harm to Defendant, which runs one of the best operated school systems in the state of Maryland.
- 28. Plaintiff has a high likelihood of prevailing on the merits of this case. Board member Mallo announced her intention of violating the Open Meetings Act when she stated after the failed vote that "I move that we go into recess to consider the impacts of that last failed motion." The Open Meetings Act expressly prohibits just that public bodies in the state of Maryland from moving a meeting into recess to conduct official business. After Ms. Mallo announced her intention, the board members recessed to deliberate and make a decision behind closed doors, and then came back to revote, which resulted in a sudden approval vote. Such a dramatic change of heart makes it extremely likely that Defendant continued to discuss public affairs behind closed doors.
- 29. Given the legislature's strong support for open and public discourse, resolution of this matter goes to the heart of our Democratic ideals and is therefore in the public's interest.

- 30. All decisions reached by the Board subsequent to the Open Meetings Act violation are tainted by the improper move to Closed Session in order to discuss matters that were required to be discussed in Open Session.
- 31. As the Board has already taken a final action in this redistricting decision, the only adequate remedy for the Board's willful failure to comply with both the letter of §3-301 and the spirit of the entire Open Meetings Act is for this Court to declare the Final Action of the Board in moving Polygons 132, 1132, and 2132 from Clemens Crossing Elementary School to Bryant Woods Elementary School to be void.

CLAIM FOR RELIEF

- 32. Plaintiff Dimitrov incorporates and re-alleges the averments contained in paragraphs 1 through 31.
- 33. Faced with opposition in enacting its redistricting plan, Defendant held a closed session meeting, in willful and flagrant violation of § 3-305 of the Open Meetings Act. This illegal and covert meeting pushed one board member to change her vote, which flipped the decision to approve the redistricting plan in contravention of the letter and spirit of the Open Meetings Act, which establishes that it is "essential" that "public business be conducted openly and publicly" and that "the public be allowed to observe (i) the performance of public officials; and (ii) the deliberations and decisions that the making of public policy involves."

RELIEF SOUGHT

Plaintiff Martin Vassilev Dimitrov requests that this Court:

(a) Issue an injunction to prevent the Board from moving forward with any and all redistricting while this matter is decided, as provided by Open Meetings Act § 3-401(d)(2);

(b) Declare the Final Action of the Board of Education in regard to moving Polygons 132, 1132, and 2132 to be void as the Board willfully failed to comply with §3-301 of the Open Meetings

Act and that no other remedy is adequate, as provided by Open Meetings Act § 3-401(d)(4).

(c) Declare the Final Action of the Board of Education in regard to all votes taken subsequent to

the violation of the Open Meetings Act to be void as the Board willfully failed to comply with

§3-301 of the Open Meetings Act and that no other remedy is adequate, as provided by Open

Meetings Act § 3-401(d)(4).

(d) Hold a hearing immediately on this instant Petition;

(e) Award Plaintiff his costs in this action as provided by Open Meetings Act § 3-401(d)(5)(i);

and

(f) Grant such other and further relief as this Court may deem just and proper.

Memorandum for the Record—11/22/2019

At the Board meeting of 11/21/2019, when the Board was voting on the school attendance areas, a motion (motion #4) failed. Upon its failure, I motioned/called for a recess to allow me the opportunity to consider the impact of the vote failure.

As had happened previously in the evening, when we were presented new information, I requested and was granted a 15 minute recess and review to consider new information. During this earlier time, I took my paperwork of new information with me and retreated first to the Board Planning Room and then to a semi-private space at the desk of one of the Board's administrative personnel to evaluate the information.

With the failure of the vote, I knew that the cascading effects of the vote would be critically impactful to the whole structure of the redistricting plan.

I picked up my packet of information and retreated into the Board Planning Room. Ms. Coombs and Ms. Taj were already in the room. Ms. Taj asked what happened not fully understanding the implications of the motion's failure to pass. I expressed my thinking that the whole elementary plan fell apart. I expressed to both Coombs and Taj that I believed we would have to walk back all of West Columbia. Ms. Taj expressed that we could not possibly do that. I informed her that I believed it was our only option in light of the vote failure. I then set my packet of papers on the far end of the conference table.

At some point, we were joined by Board Administrator Kathy Hanks.

Ms. Taj remarked that only the prevailing side could reconsider the vote. Directing her comments to Ms. Coombs, She pleaded with Ms. Coombs to reconsider the vote.

Ms. Coombs responded that she was being bullied by the left and the right because she was the swing vote [referring, I believe, to the political spectrum].

At that point, I left to return to the dais in order to get additional materials for my consideration. As I left, Ms. Coombs was crying about the situation.

When I returned to the Board Planning Room, the room was filled with Board members and the Superintendent entered expressing that an administrative session could only be called to explain the impact of the moves, but that Board members could not ask questions or deliberate.

At that point, Chair Ellis informed the Superintendent that we were ready to return to the dais and the vote would be reconsidered. Ms. Coombs expressed that she would be bringing the motion #4 up for reconsideration. According to the time stamp on the video recording, the amount of time of the recess was less than four minutes.

I remarked to the Deputy Superintendent that I would like to hear what the Superintendent might have said with regards to the impact, but at that point, the Board and Administration had begun to file into the Board Room.

Chair Ellis reconvened the meeting and inadvertently called it an administrative session. Ms. Coombs brought the motion back up for reconsideration while crying. She also expressed that she did it because otherwise the whole plan fell apart.

At some point later, the Superintendent asked to consult privately with Chair Ellis. At that point, Chair Ellis corrected the record to reflect that an administrative session did not occur.

At no point did a closed meeting occur. Nor did the Board willfully circumvent the sunshine laws or Open Meetings Act.

To my knowledge, the Board did not deliberate on the actions to be taken when we returned to public session, nor did Board members direct Ms. Coombs as to her actions.

My sole intent in calling for the recess was to allow me the opportunity to evaluate the impact that might occur with this unexpected motion failure, given the opposite had occurred in the straw vote 3 days earlier (Monday 11/18/19).

Justification:

The Howard County Board of Education met on November 21, 2019 to vote on redistricting motions at the close of a very contentious process that divided the community and even made national news. Upon the failure of two motions moving specific polygons, Board member Mallo "moved that the Board go into recess to consider the impacts of the failure of [those] motions." The community has been very involved in the process for public hearings, work sessions, and attendance at the meeting to vote on the decisions. The Board did not mention any exception to the Open Meetings Act when they went into closed session to strong arm a Board member into changing her vote. The Board came back from their private meeting during this open meeting and immediately voted to reconsider their previous vote. The community did not get to hear the justifications for why one Board member, Coombs, changed her vote which made the motion pass. Nor was there a justification of one of the exceptions to go into a closed meeting. One Board member, Wu, asked if a vote was needed after Board member Mallo "moved to go into recess" and he was told no. After the Board realized their violation of the Open Meetings Act, they took a recess and the Chair came back to state that she may have inadvertently stated that they went into closed meeting for administrative function, but they did not.

The Open Meetings Act manual introduction states:

The ability of the public, its representatives, and the media to attend, report on, and broadcast meetings of public bodies and to witness the phases of the deliberation, policy formation, and decision making of public bodies ensures the accountability of government to the citizens of the State.

This "recess" to discuss the impacts of a vote is the worst kind of action by a public body, voting on a very public matter in an open session, and then hiding in secret because some members did not like the outcome, without the public being able to witness the deliberation. The Board had a large number of work sessions to deliberate on these matters and to then secretly discuss a failed vote after months of public meetings is clearly a violation of the Open Meetings Act and a significant deterioration of the public trust.

The Open Meetings Act allows you to be here. We expect you to take that privilege and respect your fellow audience members. From here on out, all signs must be displayed no higher than your chin. ... They will not be waved. If they are waved, if they are above your chin, if the side conversations continue, you will be asked to leave. ... We are public servants, some of the board members make \$15,000 a year and the ones most recently elected make \$16,000 a year. ... So on social media, please stop attacking us." Why was Ms. Mallo chairing this meeting? She is neither Chair or Vice-Chair. If she wasn't, her dominance of this meeting would certainly lead one to surmise she did.

10. "Chao Wu, the school board's only immigrant member, wrote on his website Friday that he "met and talked to many community members. My notes filled 2 large notebooks. The key message from the community has been: Don't move my kids. We love our community school. As elected BOE members, we are obligated to listen to our constituents." *There wouldn't be a PR nightmare for the board if ALL members would have shared Mr. Wu's attitude.* "We made a crisis by placing balancing FARM rate as the highest priority for this

Memorandum for the Record—11/22/2019

At the Board meeting of 11/21/2019, when the Board was voting on the school attendance areas, a motion (motion #4) failed. Upon its failure, I motioned/called for a recess to allow me the opportunity to consider the impact of the vote failure.

As had happened previously in the evening, when we were presented new information, I requested and was granted a 15 minute recess and review to consider new information. During this earlier time, I took my paperwork of new information with me and retreated first to the Board Planning Room and then to a semi-private space at the desk of one of the Board's administrative personnel to evaluate the information.

With the failure of the vote, I knew that the cascading effects of the vote would be critically impactful to the whole structure of the redistricting plan.

I picked up my packet of information and retreated into the Board Planning Room. Ms. Coombs and Ms. Taj were already in the room. Ms. Taj asked what happened not fully understanding the implications of the motion's failure to pass. I expressed my thinking that the whole elementary plan fell apart. I expressed to both Coombs and Taj that I believed we would have to walk back all of West Columbia. Ms. Taj expressed that we could not possibly do that. I informed her that I believed it was our only option in light of the vote failure. I then set my packet of papers on the far end of the conference table.

At some point, we were joined by Board Administrator Kathy Hanks.

Ms. Taj remarked that only the prevailing side could reconsider the vote. Directing her comments to Ms. Coombs, She pleaded with Ms. Coombs to reconsider the vote.

Ms. Coombs responded that she was being bullied by the left and the right because she was the swing vote [referring, I believe, to the political spectrum].

At that point, I left to return to the dais in order to get additional materials for my consideration. As I left, Ms. Coombs was crying about the situation.

When I returned to the Board Planning Room, the room was filled with Board members and the Superintendent entered expressing that an administrative session could only be called to explain the impact of the moves, but that Board members could not ask questions or deliberate.

At that point, Chair Ellis informed the Superintendent that we were ready to return to the dais and the vote would be reconsidered. Ms. Coombs expressed that she would be bringing the motion #4 up for reconsideration. According to the time stamp on the video recording, the amount of time of the recess was less than four minutes.

I remarked to the Deputy Superintendent that I would like to hear what the Superintendent might have said with regards to the impact, but at that point, the Board and Administration had begun to file into the Board Room.

Chair Ellis reconvened the meeting and inadvertently called it an administrative session. Ms. Coombs brought the motion back up for reconsideration while crying. She also expressed that she did it because otherwise the whole plan fell apart.

At some point later, the Superintendent asked to consult privately with Chair Ellis. At that point, Chair Ellis corrected the record to reflect that an administrative session did not occur.

At no point did a closed meeting occur. Nor did the Board willfully circumvent the sunshine laws or Open Meetings Act.

To my knowledge, the Board did not deliberate on the actions to be taken when we returned to public session, nor did Board members direct Ms. Coombs as to her actions.

My sole intent in calling for the recess was to allow me the opportunity to evaluate the impact that might occur with this unexpected motion failure, given the opposite had occurred in the straw vote 3 days earlier (Monday 11/18/19).

(November 23, 2019, Columbia, Maryland) I've long called for all hands on deck from all our local officials to help families where they are. We need intervention, investment, and resources for vibrant communities to counter, reduce, and end the challenges and circumstances that have left many families to depend on free and reduced meals, more specifically in Oakland Mills.

No Oakland Mills is not a poor community. Yet we are a community that has been left without resources to assist an economic and socially diverse population that needs intervention (for example our residents whose first language is Spanish or parents who cannot help with homework)

We have a high concentration of specific demographics (including section 8 voucher holders) that impact the FARMS rates. To me, this has never justified any attempts to balance poverty; however, it has been my continued effort to call for lifting these families, keeping them in their neighborhoods without the disruption of others and ending their FARMS dependencies.

Upgrade the schools, where families who depend on FARMS live, in their vibrant communities (a holistic learning environment). I believe it was never the Board of Education's job to address poverty. Also, the BOE was scapegoated by other county elected officials whose duties are to reduce poverty and create opportunities.

In OM, we hear a lot about SFES and that the schools are segregated by socio-economic status. Let's be honest; that's not what the concern is. Many in OM (opposed to our community looking like the ghetto) don't want to be associated with a school that looks like high poverty on paper, so they supported a lousy plan (with faulty data) to "balance" poverty and struggle.

Next, there is also the oppressive race-baiting tactics being peddled by particular religious leaders who believe that black American students cannot unlock their high intellectual potentials amongst one another in their community classrooms without unjustly busing in students from wealthier households "to balance the numbers."

Justification:

The Howard County Board of Education met on November 21, 2019 to vote on redistricting motions at the close of a very contentious process that divided the community and even made national news. Upon the failure of two motions moving specific polygons, Board member Mallo "moved that the Board go into recess to consider the impacts of the failure of [those] motions." The community has been very involved in the process for public hearings, work sessions, and attendance at the meeting to vote on the decisions. The Board did not mention any exception to the Open Meetings Act when they went into closed session to strong arm a Board member into changing her vote. The Board came back from their private meeting during this open meeting and immediately voted to reconsider their previous vote. The community did not get to hear the justifications for why one Board member, Coombs, changed her vote which made the motion pass. Nor was there a justification of one of the exceptions to go into a closed meeting. One Board member, Wu, asked if a vote was needed after Board member Mallo "moved to go into recess" and he was told no. After the Board realized their violation of the Open Meetings Act, they took a recess and the Chair came back to state that she may have inadvertently stated that they went into closed meeting for administrative function, but they did not.

The Open Meetings Act manual introduction states:

The ability of the public, its representatives, and the media to attend, report on, and broadcast meetings of public bodies and to witness the phases of the deliberation, policy formation, and decision making of public bodies ensures the accountability of government to the citizens of the State.

This "recess" to discuss the impacts of a vote is the worst kind of action by a public body, voting on a very public matter in an open session, and then hiding in secret because some members did not like the outcome, without the public being able to witness the deliberation. The Board had a large number of work sessions to deliberate on these matters and to then secretly discuss a failed vote after months of public meetings is clearly a violation of the Open Meetings Act and a significant deterioration of the public trust.

RE: Redistricting Polygon 1132
Notice of Violations and Notice of Appeal

Dear Board of Education Members:

Our office has been retained by members of Polygon 1132 (hereinafter referred to as "Polygon 1132") to assist them in this redistricting process. It is our position that you, members of the Board of Education, have violated the following:

<u>Policy 2000</u> and <u>COMAR 13A.01.05.06 B. (1):</u> The board has failed to come up with a sound education policy and failed to meet the interest of the school system. By way of example, the board voted to move Polygons 132, 1132 and 2132 from Clemens Crossing Elementary School to Bryant Woods Elementary School.

Busing children in Polygons 132, 1132, and 2121, who live less than a mile away from Clemens Crossing ES, to Bryant Woods ES, which is nearly four times farther away, is not sound educational policy unless the costs of this move are outweighed by its benefits.

The costs include:

- Additional busing of 76 children from the above Polygons, which will cost the school system approximately \$35 thousand dollars a year (average costs from the U.S. Department of Education, National Center for Education Statistics). Converting the Polygons listed above to a walk zone has been discussed with the Director of Pupil Transportation, Mr. David Ramsay and a walker survey will take place if these Polygons remain at Clemens Crossing ES.
- Additional time for all children involved an additional 2 hours/ week spent on the bus for every student which reduces time for sleep, homework, and community involvement.
- Disruption of school and community for children which, according to the MacAuthor Foundation, has been shown to disrupt children's "academic skills as well as emotional functioning." This is especially applicable to the special needs children in our neighborhood.
- Reduction in family participation with the school community given the increased distance and loss of established relationships.
- Overcrowding of Bryant Woods ES. Bryant Woods ES has a small and older building that is lacking in the resources that newer facilities enjoy. The condition of this building, along with the higher levels of need of many of the students, would indicate that moving additional students to the school would be harmful to all students involved.

The benefits include:

• Decrease in the FARMs rates of Bryant Woods by approximately 4% (depending on the data set in use). A decrease in FARMs rates by 4% has not been shown to have any appreciable benefit to children experiencing poverty. In addition, please note that this move does not actually decrease the number of FARM eligible children or the resources that they require. It simply adds additional children who will reduce the overall resources available for each individual child.

Given that there are substantial costs associated with moving children to Bryant Woods ES and no appreciable benefits, this move violates sound education policy. The board could have achieved the same result, while maintaining its agenda, by using many other available alternative plans, such as:

• Reducing the number of children transferred from Swansfield ES to Clemens Crossing ES by only transferring either Polygons 53 and 2135 OR 2174 from Swansfield ES to Clemens Crossing ES and allowing 132, 1132 and 2132 to remain at Clemens Crossing. This alternative is beneficial for the entire community due to 1) reduced bus times/commute distances, 2) fewer educational and community disruptions, 3) better

utilization of Swansfield ES facility, 4) avoiding overcrowding at Bryant Woods ES. This plan achieves similar benefits to the BoE plan in that 1) the FARMs rate at Swansfield ES is still reduced by 15% from its current rate, 2) Bryant Woods ES has a smaller total number of FARM eligible children.

<u>Data Inaccuracies COMAR 13A.01.05.06 B. (1):</u> The board has also failed to come up with a sound education policy because it has relied on inaccurate data. The data that the BOE relied upon to form their consolidated redistricting plan contains significant inaccuracies which warrant further investigation to correct the proposed Polygon moves that may have been made based on this flawed data. A substantial amount of FARMs data has changed between the data that Dr. Maritano's provided to the BoE eight weeks ago and the current data in use. The following data points and supporting images at the end of this document reveal the unexplained changes and the questionable validity of the data.

- Capacity and FARM percentages data data was significantly altered in November, indicating that one or more data sets used in this process are inaccurate.
- Calculation errors resulted from Suppressed data Polygons with Zero students Bryant Woods ES Percent of Suppressed Polygons is at 35.29% and contributes to large calculation errors regarding its already over capacity utilization.

COMAR 13A.01.05.06 B (4): The Board's decisions have resulted from an unlawful procedure violating the members due process rights. While some Howard County residents have had notice of the intent to move their specific Polygons since June 2019, when feasibility studies and resulting redistricting options were released, others, specifically residents of Polygons 132, 1132 and 2132 have had less than 40 hours of actionable notice.

The first mention of a potential move for these Polygons was made on Tuesday, November 12th at the end of the working session. These Polygons had until Thursday, November 14th at 1pm to express their concerns to the BoE. During this time, no public testimony was allowed.

On Thursday, November 14th, a motion was made to move Polygon 1132 from CCES to Bryant Woods ES and this motion failed 4:3. However, during the last work session on Monday November 18th, the BOE declared the November 14th motion was invalid and determined that these Polygons had been moved to Bryant Woods in accordance with the consolidated redistricting plan. Because of the inaccurate wording of the motion, Polygon 1132 was moved even though this was clearly counter to the intention of the board at the time.

The BOE vote and decision on an "erroneous" motion on November 14th caused the community to suspended advocacy efforts that would have been continued had accurate information on the status of the BoE's redistricting plan been available. The revelation of this error on November 14th, the day of the final vote, gave the community no opportunity to timely submit testimony or

advocate further. Therefore, residents of these Polygons were not afforded an equal opportunity to testify, advocate and contribute to the redistricting process. The Board's decisions have resulted from procedural mishaps violating the member's right to due process.

Before your final vote today, we respectfully ask you to reconsider your proposal of moving Polygon 1132 from Clemens Crossing ES to Bryant Woods ES in order to allow the community to remain intact and avoid a lengthy appeal.

You are advised to govern yourself accordingly.
