Hi Kerrie,

From your testing data, it appears that Hammond has a test positivity rate of 10.4% for students. Our county positivity rate during that time was approximately 28%. We do recognize these cases represent community transmission which occurred while schools were closed. At this time, the school does not meet criteria for an outbreak.

The testing was helpful to find unknown positives and isolate them so secondary transmission could be interrupted. As you know, after a positive case is identified, quarantining close contacts is the next step to prevent new cases.

While the HCHD will interview cases for community contact tracing purposes, we are unable to do school contact tracing, as we don't have access to school information. If school contact tracing cannot be performed to identify and quarantine contacts, weekly testing of staff and students should occur to provide early identification and isolation of cases.

Here are our recommendations to prevent additional cases in the school:

- 1. Perform weekly screening testing of all staff and students, regardless of vaccination status.
- 2. Test all students who participate in high-risk sports (e.g. wrestling, basketball, cheerleading, etc.) or activities (e.g. chorus, band, etc.) weekly regardless of vaccination status. If in a cohort outbreak, test twice weekly.
- 3. Avoid holding large gatherings (e.g. assemblies, concerts, spectators at sporting events, etc.).
- 4. Consider postponing high-risk activities if there is an outbreak in that cohort.
- 5. Encourage vaccination (primary series and boosters if eligible) for students and staff, especially for students participating in high-risk activities.
- 6. Perform diagnostic testing on staff and students with symptoms of COVID.
- 7. Enforce consistent and correct mask use by staff and students.
- 8. Promote physical distancing of 3 feet between students when possible.
- 9. Provide adequate ventilation throughout the school.
- 10. Ensure proper hand washing practices.
- 11. Identify and report new cases and outbreaks in a timely manner.
- 12. Provide contact information when available, especially in outbreaks or high-risk

settings.

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


I am sending this email for HCPSS to respond. It was not HCHD's recommendation to purchase K95's for staff and students. Our recommendation remains to wear a well fitted comfortable mask that the individual will wear reliably. We recommend surgical masks over cloth masks. We generally only recommend respirators for HCW's in particular settings due to the requirements for fit testing and the challenge wearing them for long periods of time. While I believe there is not much harm in the general public wearing respirators, I am concerned that people wearing them may not wear them properly, exposing themselves more than a surgical mask, and have a false sense of security about wearing these mask.

The CDC guidance from the 12/28 media release (which is the only writtent guidance to date) does not have different recommendations based on whether or not someone is old enough to get the booster, only if the person has been boosted.

Data shows that immunity wanes significantly over time with only 2 doses and after the booster, immunity is restored almost to levels seen shortly after a primary series. So, I think it makes sense biologically to consider them unboosted and quarantine them, which is how I am interpreting the CDC guidance.

We'll let you know if there is other guidance released to address this.

The Howard County Health Department is endorsing the CDC's isolation and quarantine guidance for the general population released on December 28, 2021, including in the K-12 school setting.

We are expecting additional CDC and MDH guidance specific to the school setting in the near future, and we will modify our recommendations if needed.

- 4. Consider postponing high-risk events/activities if there is an outbreak in that cohort.

HCHD recommends as preventative measure surveillance testing of athletes that participate in high risk sports regardless of vaccine status. #### Kerrie,

Could we receive HCHD guidance on this? When a school receives the school outbreak designation and we suspend all extracurricular activities at that school, when should we consider resuming those activities? Below are the three options we were considering but they may also have a completely different thought. Any guidance would be greatly appreciated. Thanks.

- **Option 1**: Suspend activities for 14 days with a reevaluation coming after 10. At that point we can make the decision to return after 14 days or extend the suspension depending on how many students have been cleared to return.
- **Option 2**: Suspend all extracurriculars at a school for the entire duration of time the school is considered to have an outbreak by the MDH website even if most students have been cleared to return.
- **Option 3**: Suspend activities for the remainder of the week (between 1-5 days) and reevaluate each week for the following week.

Hi Kerrie,

We reviewed the data holistically, and do not recommend mass screening at these two schools because the cohorts do not contain large groups of children and the case rates are not comparatively very high.

It is important to note that our data lags HCPSS data and knowing that not all cases receive CT, you have more information than we do at any one time. So if you are seeing trends or concerns in cases, the only way we can make the best recommendations is for just in time data sharing. Also without CT we are unable to identify cohorts, so the definition of school wide OB defaults to more than 5% of school population. And even then more details are needed to make refined recommendations.

As mentioned at the BOE meeting, if we are to get through this we need to make more targeted decisions and recommendations. That only happens with accurate and timely data.

Hi Kerrie,

As mentioned on Friday, we are reviewing our testing recommendations for symptomatic individuals with a negative antigen test (current recs-do a confirmatory PCR). We looked at the test result data as best we can (not actively collecting this info) and we are seeing average 1-2 per week of symptomatic, antigen negative, PCR positive people. Some of these are in known OB schools though (people were not identified as a contact).

If we changed the recommendation to not require a confirmatory PCR, how would this affect the staff's workload? Contacts don't need to be quarantined, or even identified until a positive result. PCR tests are readily available and many times the result can be available within a day. What would be the benefit balancing out the risk of not isolating a person who is positive?

We want to be thoughtful about changing this and I wanted to get input from you.

Dear Parents and Guardians,

Thank you for your efforts to keep our community healthy by monitoring your student(s) for symptoms of COVID-19 and complying with universal masking. This letter is to inform you of changes to how Harford County Public Schools (HCPS) will respond to COVID-19. These changes will begin today, Tuesday, September 28, 2021.

Starting today, the quarantine period will be reduced from fourteen days to ten days. We will also modify our student-to-student contact tracing; we will only identify student close contacts in situations where students are unmasked. Contact tracing investigations that involve contact with any staff members will remain unchanged. Students currently in quarantine were identified during higher transmission of COVID-19 so they will continue to quarantine, but they may return to school once 10 days have passed since their last exposure to a person with COVID-19.

Parents will be alerted via letter by school administration if their student is affected by a classroom or school outbreak. A hard copy of the letter may be sent home with the affected student and/or distributed via email. Outbreaks are determined by the Maryland Department of Health (MDH), as defined here: Classroom/cohort outbreak:

• Two or more laboratory-confirmed COVID-19 cases among students/teachers/staff with onsets (or, if asymptomatic, collection dates) within a 14-day period, and who are epidemiologically linked, but not household contacts.

School outbreak:

Three or more classrooms with cases from separate households that meet the classroom/cohort outbreak definition that occurs within 14 days, OR
5% or more unrelated students/teachers/staff have confirmed COVID-19 within a 14-day period (minimum of 10 unrelated students/teachers/staff).

Harford County Public Schools (HCPS) is watching the experience our greater Harford County community has with COVID-19, modifying protocols when appropriate, focusing on essential activities to a student's learning, and creating unique safety plans for higher risk activities, such as dances. As such, starting November 15, 2021, HCPS will begin an after-school testing program for high school winter sports and fine arts. Students impacted by this program, which includes an opt-out for vaccinated students, will receive more details next month.

Please continue to monitor vourself and your student(s) for signs of illness, including a fever, cough, difficulty breathing, new onset of severe headache, sore throat, vomiting, diarrhea, or new loss of taste or smell. If you notice symptoms, please stay home and consult with your health care provider. In addition, please continue to minimize the spread of COVID-19 by always maintaining maximum physical distance from others, wearing a face covering when you are out of your home, and washing your hands regularly. If you are eligible to receive a COVID-19 vaccine, please speak with your health care provider about being vaccinated.

Thank you for your help in keeping our community healthy.

It's a great way for staff to uniformly keep track of the outbreaks and would replace the SMIL form report currently sent to our staff.

I hope most of this CT work can be transferred over to an admin person, your staff have important nursing work to do! Non-nursing staff can be identified to gather the contact information, provide it to the health department and call parents/guardians. When they reach the parent/guardian, the conversation should be limited to their child needs to be quarantined and the health department will be in touch regarding duration of quarantine and next steps.

Hi Kerrie,

It's an interesting policy change for UMB. As you know, the current guidance calls for masking, but does not make quarantine exceptions for the different types of masks.

In an ideal world (i.e. wearing them consistently and correctly), here is the hierarchy of respiratory protection for masks: N95>KN95>surgical facemask>cloth face covering.

But in the real world, that hierarchy is disrupted. Unfortunately, the N95/KN95 masks are extremely difficult to wear, and they have a lot of drawbacks. Breathing is more difficult, they are tight on the face, the straps need to be worn appropriately, speech is affected (muffled), young children tend to be mouth breathers (mask becomes moist) and most people do not tolerate them for long periods of time. These masks are not designed for use in children, their faces are so varied at different ages, and there are not as many sizes or types available as there are in adults. In addition, people should be tested to assure the mask fits their face to ensure the maximum amount of protection. In healthcare settings, unless a person is fit tested for a specific mask they are wearing, they are considered as effective as surgical facemasks. The FDA regulations around current masks do not include those for children as far as I'm aware, and I haven't seen any data supporting their use in this population.

In addition, one major concern is the staff and children would be constantly pulling the mask up, down and all around to alleviate discomfort. Then, they are left with no/decreased respiratory

protection while doing that and the mask becomes ill-fitting due to the frequent manipulation.

I wear them when I work with tuberculosis patients, and I can't wait to remove them by the end of the 30-minute visit!

This is a statement I like to give: The mask a child will wear is the best mask.

Currently there are no recommendations from any medical professional organization or public health agency recommending the use of N95/KN95 masks in the school setting. For the reasons I outlined above, I highly doubt we would ever change quarantine requirements even if they were used in schools. With all of that said, we all know guidance changes daily and if we hear of anything under discussion, we'll let you know.

Dear UMB Community:

University of Maryland, Baltimore (UMB) President Bruce E. Jarrell's <u>Sept. 2 letter</u> shared that there would be an update this week about safety measures at UMB related to COVID-19. After consideration by the Recovery Task Force's University Health focus area group, changes to policies regarding face coverings/masks as well as food and drink at indoor events are outlined below.

#### Face Covering/Mask Policy Change

To increase safety on campus, UMB is moving to require or encourage the use of KN95 masks, instead of surgical or cloth face coverings, as outlined below, in nonclinical settings (clinical settings maintain separate requirements). A KN95 mask is designed to reduce the amount of dust or virus a person breathes in by approximately 95 percent.

A KN95 provides better protection for the wearer than a cloth mask while also reducing the spread of the virus from the wearer. Importantly, a person wearing a KN95 who had a recent close contact with a person who tested positive with COVID-19 is less likely to develop COVID-19. As such, KN95s generally reduce or eliminate self-isolation or quarantine requirements, which is particularly important in classroom environments with students sitting in a communal setting for long periods of time. This is another measure to ensure that we are keeping ourselves and our UMB community safe, while minimizing interruptions to education and work. We will re-evaluate the KN95 requirement in the coming months.

UMB will provide an initial KN95 mask to each person through each school/unit. Your school/unit will provide direction on how to receive your KN95, but please feel free to provide your own. They are readily available online and in many local retailers. K95s, while disposable, are designed to be worn multiple times safely.

When should I wear a KN95? The UMB Policy Requiring Use of Face Coverings outlines when a person is required to wear a face covering at UMB. The policy specifically requires or recommends a KN95 as follows:

- KN95s are the only permitted face covering for unvaccinated faculty, staff, and students –
  whether they have a valid exemption or not. As such, starting Sept. 15, unvaccinated
  employees and students must wear a KN95 when required to wear a face covering
  under the UMB Policy Requiring Use of Face Coverings.
- At some point in the near future, KN95s will be required for fully vaccinated students, faculty, and staff when participating in classroom and training activities. Fully vaccinated faculty or staff delivering in-person lectures or presentations may remove their KN95 while speaking as long as at least 6 feet of physical distance can be maintained between the faculty member or presenter and the students or audience. Faculty or staff who are not vaccinated must wear a KN95 while presenting. The date of this requirement will depend on the availability and distribution of KN95s across campus and will be communicated as soon as that date is known.
- Starting immediately, KN95s are strongly recommended for fully vaccinated students, faculty, and staff when participating in group activities where 6 feet of physical distance cannot be maintained or more than five people are present.

#### UMB COVID-19 Guidance on Events, Eating, and Drinking

As of Sept. 20, 2021, UMB indoor events may not provide food that is intended to be eaten at the event – only grab-and-go food and beverages will be permitted. This will minimize the need to remove masks while in group settings and thereby reduce the risk of spreading COVID-19 on campus.

#### What other actions should I take?

To protect yourself and others, you should:

- Get the COVID-19 vaccine if you have not already done so. The vaccine is the best way to protect yourself and your family, friends, classmates, and co-workers from COVID-19.
- Stay home if you are sick or have symptoms consistent with COVID-19. Call the UMB COVID-19 Hotline at 1-800-701-9863 if you have COVID-19 symptoms.
- Practice physical distancing when feasible.
- Wash your hands frequently for at least 20 seconds with soap and water.
- Avoid touching your eyes, nose, and mouth.
